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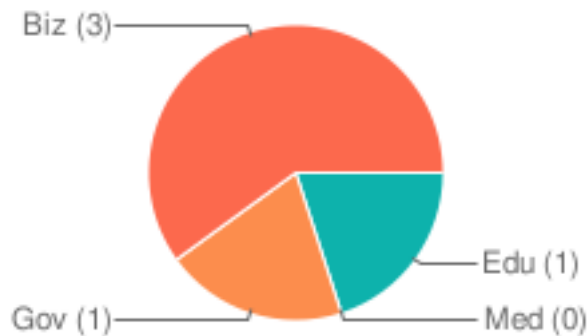

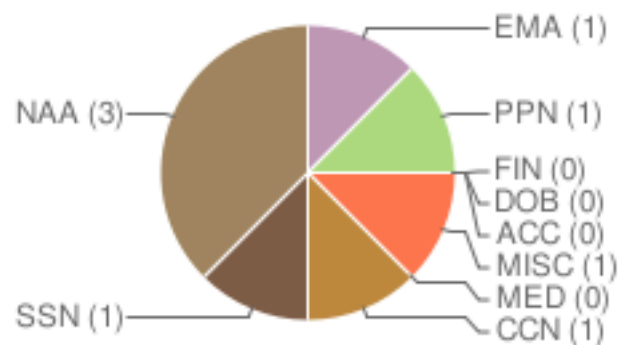
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The following graphs show data loss incidents by data type and by business type over the period of this report.
