As detailed in the attached letter to potentially affected individuals, we recently became aware that certain information about mortgage loan borrowers was made available on the internet. Specifically, the mortgage loans were part of a pool of loans that was subject to a securitization transaction that required a registration to be filed with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission ("SEC"). Normally, the documents filed with the SEC include general information concerning each of the loans involved in the securitization, but do not include personal information. However, in this instance, some personal information was inadvertently included in an exhibit to a Form 8-K Credit Suisse First Boston Mortgage Securities Corp. ("Credit Suisse") caused to be filed with the SEC on March 15, 2006 ("Form 8-K"). The information mistakenly included in the Form 8-K contained information regarding an individual's loan application and loan, including the individual's name, property address, monthly income, Social Security number and credit score. The Form 8-K was then made available on the SEC's website and subsequently appeared on other websites that either link to the SEC website or republish the SEC information. Credit Suisse did not become aware of this inadvertent disclosure until just recently. Credit Suisse then took immediate action to remove the information from the SEC website and all other websites that Credit Suisse identified. Moreover, Credit Suisse

has hired an expert to search the internet and reconfirm that the information is not posted on other websites.

We write to inform you of an incident involving information about mortgage loan borrowers that recently came to our attention. As detailed in the attached letter to potentially affected individuals, we recently became aware that certain information about mortgage loan borrowers was made available on the internet. Specifically, the mortgage loans were part of a pool of loans that was subject to a securitization transaction that required a registration to be filed with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission ("SEC").

Normally, the documents filed with the SEC include general information concerning each of the loans involved in the securitization, but do not include personal information. However, in this instance, some personal information about the borrowers was inadvertently included in an exhibit to a Form 8-K Credit Suisse First Boston Mortgage Securities Corp. ("Credit Suisse") caused to be filed with the SEC on March 15, 2006 ("Form 8-K"). The information mistakenly included in the Form 8-K contained information regarding an individual's loan application and loan, including the individual's name, property address, monthly income, Social Security number and credit score.

The Form 8-K was then made available on the SEC's website and subsequently appeared on other websites that either link to the SEC website or republish the SEC information. Credit Suisse did not become aware of this inadvertent disclosure until just recently. Credit Suisse then took immediate action to remove the information from the SEC website and all other websites that Credit Suisse identified. Moreover, Credit Suisse has hired an expert to search the internet and reconfirm that the information is not posted on other websites.

We have determined that, in total, personal information about borrowers relating to approximately 3,000 properties was inadvertently disclosed, and of those 3,000 properties, 130 are located in New York. We plan to notify potentially affected individuals by regular mail on or about February 23, 2007.

To date, we have not received any reports that lead us to believe that any of the personal information was accessed or used by anyone for improper purposes. Nonetheless, as outlined in more detail in the attached letter, Credit Suisse has arranged for affected borrowers to enroll, at no cost to them, in an online credit monitoring service provided by TransUnion, one of the three major credit reporting agencies.

Dear Borrower:

We are writing to inform you about an incident that involved an inadvertent disclosure of some personal information about you in a regulatory filing and to provide you with important guidance about what you can do to protect yourself against possible misuse of that information. The information in question has to do with your mortgage loan, currently serviced by America's Servicing Company ("ASC").

Credit Suisse regrets this incident and takes very seriously its obligation to protect the privacy of all customers.

Description of Incident

Your mortgage loan was sold by your original mortgage lender and included as part of a group of loans held by Credit Suisse First Boston Mortgage Securities Corp. ("Credit Suisse"). Credit Suisse converted this group of loans into mortgage-backed securities through a process known as a securitization. In order to complete this securitization process, Credit Suisse was required by law to publicly file certain documents with the United States Securities and Exchange Commission ("SEC").

Normally, the documents filed with the SEC include general information concerning each of the loans involved in a securitization, but do not include personal information. However, in this instance, some personal information was inadvertently included in an exhibit to a Form 8-K Credit Suisse caused to be filed with the SEC on March 15, 2006 ("Form 8-K").

The information mistakenly included in the Form 8-K contained information about your loan application and loan, including your name, property address, monthly income, Social Security number and credit score. The Form 8-K was then made available on the SEC's website and subsequently appeared on other websites that either link to the SEC website or republish the SEC information.

Credit Suisse did not become aware of this inadvertent disclosure until just recently. Credit Suisse then took immediate action to remove the information from the SEC website and all other websites that Credit Suisse has been able to identify. As of the date of this letter, the Form 8-K containing information about you has been removed from all the identified websites. We have not received any reports that lead us to believe that any of the personal information was accessed or used by anyone for improper purposes. Nonetheless, we cannot be certain that the information is completely inaccessible or has not been acquired by someone who will attempt to use it for improper purposes.

Credit Suisse has strengthened its internal policies and procedures to further protect against errors of this nature from occurring in the future.

How to Protect Yourself – Steps We Recommend You Take

Credit Suisse wants to help you protect your privacy and the privacy of all customers. To that end, Credit Suisse has arranged for you to enroll in a credit monitoring service provided by TransUnion, one of the three major credit reporting agencies, at no cost to you, for one year from the date you enroll. The online credit monitoring service covers all three of the major credit agencies. To enroll in this service, go to the TransUnion Web site at <http://www.truecredit.com/code> and in the space referenced as gift certificate code, enter [CODE] (case sensitive), and follow the simple steps to receive your products online instantly. If you do not have internet access or prefer to enroll via telephone for a similar credit monitoring service, at no cost to you, please call TransUnion, at 1-800-242-5181, and enter [CODE] when prompted. Please note that the gift certificate code, or the service provided via telephone, is valid until June 1, 2007.

In addition, set forth below are some other simple steps you can take to protect yourself against identity theft or other fraudulent misuse of information about you.

Remain vigilant over the next twelve to twenty-four months and promptly report incidents of suspected identity theft to ASC. Notably, watch for any unusual activity on your credit card accounts or suspicious items on your bills. You may wish to contact your credit card issuers and inform them of the incident. You may also wish to do the following:

- You may periodically obtain credit reports from each of the three nationwide credit reporting agencies and have information relating to fraudulent transactions deleted. Under federal law, you are entitled to one free copy of your credit report every twelve months from each of the major credit reporting agencies. You may obtain a free copy of your credit report by going on the Internet to www.AnnualCreditReport.com or by calling 1-877-FACTACT (1-877-322-8228). If you would rather write, a request form is available on www.AnnualCreditReport.com. You may want to obtain copies of your credit reports to ensure the accuracy of the report information.
- To further protect yourself, you may contact the fraud departments of the three major credit reporting agencies. They will discuss your options with you. You have the right to ask that the three credit reporting agencies place a "fraud alert" in your file. A fraud alert can make it more difficult for someone to get credit in your name because it tells creditors to follow certain procedures to protect you. It also may delay your ability to obtain credit. You may place a fraud alert in your file by calling just one of the three nationwide credit reporting agencies. As soon as that agency processes your fraud alert, it will notify the other two credit reporting agencies, which then must also place fraud alerts in your file. **Please note, however, that if you will be using the online credit monitoring service outlined above and also wish to place a fraud alert on your file, please enroll first for the credit monitoring service.**
